Classic Chevrolet Cabriolet

Issued: October 1990

This is a 3 in 1 kit, offering the options for building in totally stock form, custom or full on drag racing style of the time.

This kit was originally released in 1975 as a new tool. This issue was released 15 years later in 1990, with the last re-issue being done in 2000.

The coupe version has been offered many more times over the years, starting out in 1968, then new tooling added for dirt track versions in the late '70's. The trend of "retro" box art is showing on the latest version of the coupe, revisiting the Salt Flats type car.

This kit is quite typical of the late '80's and '90's box art with it's monochromatic pearl pink paint work and "shaved" body, devoid of all chrome trim and door handles save for the grille and mag wheels. Even the headlights are gone!

The instruction sheet has quite the interesting write up about the 1937 model year Chevrolet, touting it's advancements in design. Several firsts in automotive design were incorporated into this model year.

The kit: Engine options:

I was impressed with the detail parts included in this offering. The stock 216 inline Six cylinder as well as the blown big block version just called Custom by the instruction sheet. The 216 has optional intakes, stock single carb or chrome dual carb intake with 2 nice non chrome carbs. Primer applied to the 216 six cylinder.

The V-8 version is really configured as a drag only set up as it offers no radiator fan , nor an exhaust system beyond the chromed fender well

headers, so a little imagination needs to be used here if your going for the "custom" design. I will attempt to parts box the exhaust system so I can make use of the V-8.

Wheel options:

Factory style non chrome steel wheels with two front and two rear wheels, each with different wheel back designs. Rear chromed wheel backs having the standard hole for the steel axle, the fronts are chromed open rings that allow the molded pins on the ends of the front axle to fit into the wheel. These will not be able to roll as they are glued directly to the axle stubs. Custom wheels are chrome Cragar SS style molded very nicely.

Tires:

4 skinny Firestone factory style or the optional big and little Goodyear Polyglas tires.

All have nice tread design and clean sidewall detail with the raised lettering that can be highlighted with some acrylic white paint.

Chassis:

Front suspension has two ride heights, stock and raised ala "gasser" look. This does have nice detail parts for the front steering parts even though it's not posable steering. Rear end offers optional "torque arms" (traction bars) and two driveshafts to pick from. Assuming the one without the universal joints is to be used with the factory six cylinder as cars back then had "prop shafts" fixed to the rearends. In real life applications, the rear end is replaced completely with more modern driveline components. Prop shafts can't handle the higher power of even small V-8's of today. There is only a single exhaust set up for the stock version.

Interior:

A tub style bucket for the interior having "roll and pleat" design in the back molded in, a factory plain split back bench seat, factory dash with sharp gauge and trim detail.

Custom dashboard and bucket seats with matching "roll and pleat" with a chrome instrument cluster and steering wheel. Roll bar and shoulder harness belts are available as well.

Body:

This is where this kit really shines. The fenders are all molded separately from the main body. Also separate front inner fender panels too. This lends toward building this in many different configurations, depending on what your choice is for your






build. Open wheeled, only open front wheels, full fendered, the choices are nice to have as an option.

Headlight shells are molded with the stanchions that attach to outlined mounting points in the body, this really makes aligning them much easier. I mounted these before applying any primer to the body so they have a solid hold using Mr. Cement S liquid glue from Mr. Hobby.

I also attached the fenders to the body at this time. (Do the headlights first so you have more room while attaching without the fender in the way) I left off the inner fenders so I can paint them easier.

I did a mockup of the body on the chassis with the interior to check for fitment. I marked the embossed outline so I could be sure to get the light shells mounted properly.

The taillights are another story all together. The instructions are vague at best and totally wrong. I googled a few images of the real cars to find the actual location points. This was the closest I could determine for being factory style. I drilled holes in the body for the lights and the gas cap (had a hole underneath to be opened for gas cap)

I spent a lot of time wet sanding the body panels to get them smoother at the rumble seat seams as well as the door seams. I used a sharpie to highlight everything beforehand so I knew when it was even across the panels. There were only a few small mold lines at the rear corners of the interior.

Six Rules for Getting Kids Into Scale Modeling

IT HAS BEEN WITH much interest that I have noted increasing calls to get more kids involved in our hobby over the last few years. In 19 years as principal leader of the Wisconsin 4-H Modelclub, I have seen an awful lot of parents who have tried to interest their kids in modeling. Some succeed. Others fail totally.

I have observed that successful parents (or teachers for that matter) seem to follow certain unwritten rules. What follows is my attempt to codify these rules to help other adults in attempting to interest kids in this wonderful hobby.

RULE NO. 1: Build Together: By far this is the single most important rule. Any child will be more interested in something if there is an interested adult there with him or her. When you buy a child a model, buy two of the same kit. Sit down and build with the child. You will both have fun. You will talk to each other and you will end up with a child interested in what you are doing. With patience and some luck, in two or three years he will be showing you how to rig a biplane!

RULE NO. 2: Keep It Simple: I have lost count of the number of nine to 13 year olds I have judged at local county fairs who show up with what might have been pretty good models if they had not been their very first kits. Invariably, the kit was a well-meaning but ill-informed gift or the result of a parent with a grossly overblown idea of how simple this hobby is. Also invariably, I never see those kids back the next year.

First kits should be simple. If the child is under age 12, start with a snap kit or two. For a first glued kit, aircraft modelers have an easy choice with the Hobby Boss 1:72 Easy Build line, while car people can move on to

the usual suspects of 1:24 scale street cars. In figures, kids seem to work best with war-gaming scale fantasy figures by Citadel and War-hammer.

Whatever you choose, the emphasis should be on simplicity and buildability. A child who gets frustrated is unlikely to want to try again.

Finishing also requires simplicity. Stick with acrylics and hand brushing. When he or she gets tllose right you can easily move on to rattle cans or airbrushes.

RULE NO. 3: This Is Not School: You build a model why? To relax, of course, after the rigors of a tough day. Why would your kid be any different? He or she spends all day in school. Imagine if the idea of modeling involves strict regimentation and a total demand for detail. This is supposed to be fun for both of you.

As an example, consider directions. Every kid learned about following directions in kindergarten. They simply need to be shown how that applies to the sheet of sometimes woefully drawn paper full of odd words in front of them.

In addition, remember that you are building a model, not running a course in history or engineering. As a rule, if a child likes building the rest will invariably follow in time.

RULE NO. 4: He's not you: He may not like what you like. He certainly does not know what you know. He won't paint the same as you and (heaven forbid) he may actually want to put those awful pilot figures in that Mustang. Let him! He also isn't going to turn out a model of your level of quality for some time. That's all right.

Show him the way to use sanding sticks or how to properly use a rattle can. Let his own imagination work from that point on as a tool to develop ideas in both of you. His skills will develop the same way yours did all those years ago.

RULE NO. 5: Reduce Risks: How many times as a kid did you leave mucky glue fingerprints all over your model or the dining table? Think about that. Use materials that will, if the inevitable happens, make clean-up easy.

Acrylic paints can clean up with water and a bit of window cleaner. Use a white glue-based product to attach clear parts. Tube glue? Use liquid plastic cement or bonding agents. Likewise, avoid CA glue. Kids have a habit of gluing parts of themselves to anything and everything. The idea is to keep things simple and to avoid the idea that if something goes wrong, panic ensues. No kid wants to be involved in an activity that may result in people getting angry simply because they made a mess.

RULE NO. 6: The Play's The Thing: Let's face it. From time to time you will pick up that P-51 and fly it about the room. It's the modeling version of "air guitar." Your child will not only be no different, he will do it more. Let Him! After all, no one wants just one plane or car to play with. I suspect that you already do most of the above without thinking about it. If not, give it a try. You and your child will quite probably have more fun and the hobby will get a new member.



New Business

Treasurer's Report - Marshall Smith presented the figures and the report was accepted. Expenditures included:

- Rental deposit on HTEC -(Marshall) This has been paid up to date.
- Pre-purchasing of category award medals for DownEastCon 2024 to avoid inevitable price increases.
- IPMS Chapter dues paid up to date

Meeting Time Change – Alan mentioned that members, especially those that have a distance to drive, suggested the club meeting time be moved back an hour to 1:00 PM vs. 12:00 PM. There were a few dissenting voices who would have liked to have moved earlier in the day. The compromise is to try it and then revisit in a couple of months.

Possible DEC Themes - Alan brought up looking at Themes for the 2024 show as many things that we will do from now until July of 2024 will hinge on a theme.

- 1. All things Carolina was brought up. It turns out that the club used this regional theme in 2016 and the desire to redoux a previous theme was not well received.
- 2. Modeling 24/7 this theme was ventured forth from a spouse volunteer. The thought here is anything with a 24 (Jeff Gordon's NASCAR, or USS Reeves (CG-24), or something in 1/24 scale like an Airfix Hawker Hurricane Mk.I). Or something with a 7 in it following the same pattern. There were secondary themes such
- **3.** Review Categories (Jeff) the subject was broached regarding an OOB category. Steve Kasza, our chief

judge stated it would be too hard to judge as kit manufacturers are adding so many after-market parts to the kit, it would nearly impossible to compare a 1/48 Tamiya from 1970 OOB to a 2023 1/48 anything OOB. IPMS has redone their rules to begin to define what can be created and judged under the Basic Kit Build (BKB) categories. There are so many requirements to ensure that modelers do a BKB and not cheat that it would be a very hard category to judge. Action: Steve Kasza, Jeffrey Maples, and David Stiteler to explore and bring their findings back to the group.

Another category that was mentioned was 3-D printed and separate category for resin figures.

4. Order Medals - Alan Universally acclaimed – yes. A suggestion, however, was made regarding Best of Winners – a bigger medal on an acrylic stand.

5. Gold foil data for backs of medals and other options - Alan Universally accepted given it prove cost effective.

Tuesday Evening ZOOM Build - Jeff anyone can join, it is just an opportunity to build and shoot the breeze. There is no requirement to finish anything and while this is a group build any model can be worked on.

AMPS Report, *upcoming AMPS Events* - Mark Gray – nothing has changed on the website or correspondence in over six months. Mark stated he would report if there were changes.

Display Case - (Jeff) (Even if someone did not bring a finished build ask what they are working on)

David Mohr brought some old, boxed models – a Scarlet Tanager, a 1/700 Fletcher Class Drydock from Skywave and a couple of books. Aside from the Tanager, the rest were giveaways. David Stiteler took some goodnatured ribbing concerning when he displayed his newest B-17 to build for his USAF buddies. While he has yet to make real progress on his B-17, he now has a B-17F to research and build with a set of War Birds decals to make it look like Gen. Savage's plane in 12 O'clock High.

William Reese seems to have brough in every B-17 model ever manufactured, plus the definitive work by Edward Jablonski, "Flying Fortress". William stated he bought his first work by Jablonski with lawn mowing money earned in the early 1970's. In his lifetime, William stated he had built at least 20 B-17s. His favorite box art was the 1972 Revell issue of the 1/72 Memphis Bell. Some of his most memorable builds were the B-17F "Hells Angels" for a friend of his fathers. He also built a B-17E, Madame X which participated in the Battle of Midway and later in the South Pacific. He also built another b-17F "Sure Stuff", aka, the Duchess a plane that holds the honor of having the Medal of Honor awarded to her bombardier, Jack Mathis.

Kel Gaither presented a work in progress, a 1971 Plymouth Road Runner, number 43 driven by Richard Petty. He is doing a lot of kit-bashing to make the car look as it did when Petty drove it. He is using real automotive paint to bring a sense of realism to the model.

This model is on the front of our web-page very difficult model to build and with over 150 very small pieces to bring it to life. This beautiful model is featured on the splash page of our website.

Mark Gray brought in a beautiful set of Israeli Merkava tanks. A Merkava II from the 1970s and a new Merkava IV. He created his own sand (non-skid), paint matching, and chain-mail protection for the 1970's Merkava II. The Merkava IV

is a superb model that could be built right from the box.

William Reese displayed a number of aircraft the first being a 1/48 BF-109 Trop which sported a scratch-built cock-pit. There were fitment problems with the engine cowling that were overcome giving us a another William Reese winner.

Jeff Maples also presented a P-47 which he was quick to use as an object lesson in "decal placement guessing". A great looking model with too many wing decals.

Jim Gower brought a 1940's era model of the North Carolina that is being restored by the New Bern Ship Modeler's Guild. This wood frame with paper overlays used for detail is a combined effort of the North Carolina Museum and the Guild. It is an interesting model in that it has no scale to speak of. For example the deck bits are almost as big as the 5/38 caliber guns.

Jim Harriett brought in a beautiful Civil War 20 lb Parrott rifle, circa 1860-1861. Jim stated the olive drab color match was difficult and if the carriage wheels were broken, the model was ruined. His careful attention to detail showed in every aspect of the cannon. He also brought in a 1/35 MiniArt WWII D-Day D-7 Bulldozer. Of the 609 parts included in the kit, Jim stated that 600 of them must have been in the bulldozer tracks.

Steve Kasza brought in his usual spectacular builds – one being a completely reworked Revell AG 1/35 scale Panzerhaubitze (PzH). Steve stated that this model is more scratch built than a commercial offering. His overall take – do not waste your time. Steve also brought in a HobbyBoss 1/35 Soviet SS-23 Spider Tactical Ballistic Missile. This model

was a 2014 offering and Steve again applied his magic and produced a beautiful offering and wonderful history behind the model.

Steve Michel brought in a 1/260 scale Revell Polaris Nuclear Submarine Model Kit. This cutaway kit allowed Steve to add detail to everything including the engine room piping. He also added a Polaris missile leaving the tube complete with the most realistic flames anyone has ever seen in model.

Richard Adams (oldest modeler in the chapter) brought in three exquisitely carved and polished animals, 2 dolphins and a bear. These animals were hand carved from iron wood, or more commonly known as Eastern Hophornbeam. The wood it so hard that once carved it can be brought up to a high luster using a buffing wheel.




